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Chairman's Message

2 022 wrapped up on a positive note! By February 2022, we concluded two major projects with the Federal and Johor State Governments – namely the 'Prihatin Kasih' and 'Kasih Johor' cashless food aid programmes for the B40.

In March, we studied the topic of food security for coastal communities through conservation of seagrass meadows located south of Johor. This expands our scope of engagement with local communities beyond the Love My School student bursary and Love My Neighbourhood food aid programmes.

Schooling resumed in April with in-person or physical classroom sessions. Our Love My School cashless student bursary programme in 127 schools was reactivated, benefitting more than 13,000 B40 primary and secondary students nationwide. We are tremendously grateful to all the donors who continued to support the programme in their adopted schools.

We are especially proud of the students who participated in numerous sporting events and STEM robotics tournaments after two years of online learning. Your resilience and commitment to education is admirable! A huge thank you to the teachers who continue to inspire and encourage students to do their best.

We ran our annual charity golf and charity musical fund-raisers in May and June respectively, raising RM1.32 million and RM170,700 for our four main focus areas – Food Aid, Student Bursaries, Sustainability Programmes (e.g. skills and entrepreneurial income-generation initiatives) and Supplementary Assistance Programmes (e.g. tuition, vocational studies, and health screening).

Resuming project site visits more vigorously post-pandemic, we took stock of the progress our beneficiaries were making and celebrated their achievements. A rural Orang Asli community in Perak sold compost produced from readily available organic materials around them and made more than RM5,000 in cash income. Orang Asli communities in Pahang are reaping the fruits of their labour in chicken farming and chilli cultivation, while another community in Kelantan wait eagerly to harvest their first batch of stingless bee honey in March 2023.

The women entrepreneurs in Terengganu and Johor are thriving in their cottage businesses selling cakes, biscuits, and an assortment of cooked meals. They also participated in webinars and bazaars to inspire others to improve their lives.

We made new friends in Novartis and ProtectHealth Corporation as we assisted them in four health screening events at high-density low-cost flat areas in Penang, Johor, and Selangor.

And finally, what better way to connect with the communities we reach out to than through employee volunteerism activities. We are delighted to be carrying out our responsibilities with your support and trust.

My wife and I are deeply grateful for a blessed 2022 and we look forward to doing more meaningful programmes in the future.

Additional support is rendered through sponsorship of extra tuition classes, study camps, English literacy and numeracy workshops, and computer labs for 21st-century learning. Robotics, aquaponic projects and sports activities are also funded to enhance their learning experience in school.



Sustainability Initiatives

In addition to cashless aid, the foundation provides opportunities for beneficiaries to achieve food security and financial independence. These interventions include basic health screening, food cultivation (fruits and vegetables), farming (fish, chickens and bees), skills and entrepreneurial training, financial literacy and income-generation projects to help urban households and rural communities improve their quality of life.

Orang Asli Children's Education Fund

MyKasih intensified its efforts in Orang Asli communities through the OA Children's Education Fund which was set up 2015 by Puan Sri Jean Ngau. The fund currently supports nine rural community-initiated learning centres (locally known as Pusat Didikan Komuniti, PDKs) in Perak and Pahang.

The 400 students at these PDKs are taught by local OA teachers from the community itself using specially curated indigenous modules and lesson plans focusing on basic literacy (Reading, Writing, Counting, and Comprehension).

The PDKs are also supported through the establishment of food farms to ensure food and nutrition security as the communities reduce chronic malnutrition and stunting among the young.

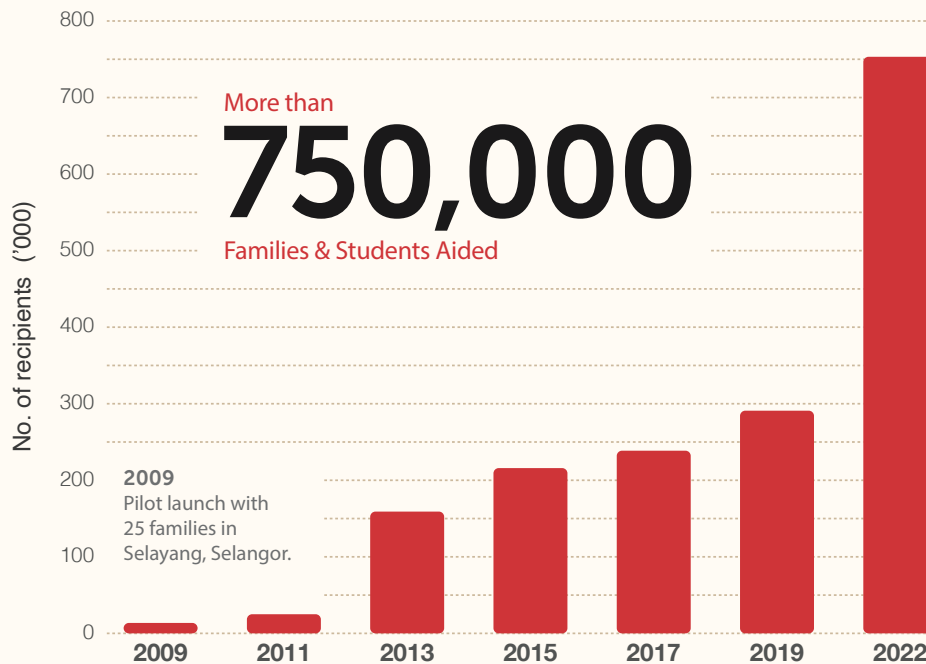


Every ringgit goes a long way in making a difference. All cash donations to MyKasih Foundation are tax-exempt and are passed in full to the beneficiaries.

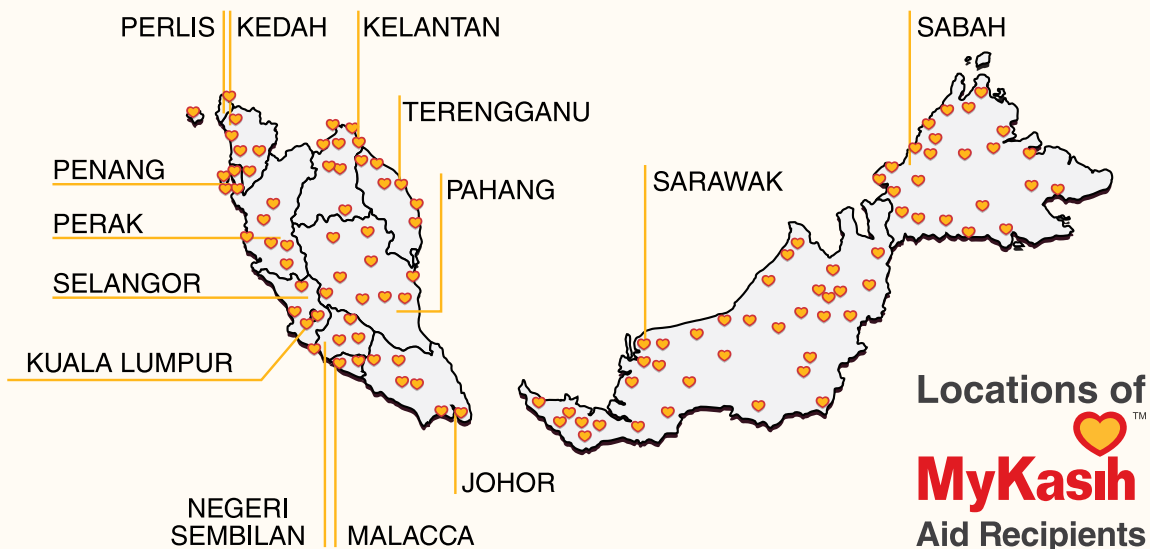
MyKasih Today

MyKasih started with a pilot MyKasih 'Love My Neighbourhood' food aid project involving 25 families back in 2009. By the end of 2022, we have channelled **RM380 million** via the MyKasih cashless payment system to more than **750,000 families** in over 400 locations nationwide, which include primary and secondary student beneficiaries aided through the MyKasih 'Love My School' bursary scheme.



The scope of the MyKasih system has expanded beyond food aid and student bursaries to include cashless payments for public transportation, fuel, medical treatments and utility bills. Essentially, the MyKad account becomes the single main account to which low-income households can use to access multiple welfare products or services.

The Ministry of Finance, Ministry of Urban Wellbeing, Housing and Local Government, Johor and Sarawak State Governments, Lembaga Zakat Selangor, Zakat Pulau Pinang and Majlis Agama Islam Melaka, have also been using the innovative MyKasih system for their respective welfare programmes for the underprivileged.

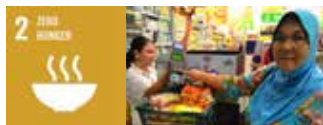

MyKasih And The UN SDGs

With the exception of Goal 6 (Clean Water & Sanitation), Goal 7 (Renewable & Clean Energy), Goal 12 (Responsible Consumption & Production) and Goal 16 (Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions), various MyKasih programmes are aligned with 13 out of the 17 SDGs as described below:



No Poverty: Our food aid, education and livelihood initiatives provide low-income households with opportunities to step out of poverty. With food on the table and children attending school or vocational studies, family members can participate in skills and entrepreneurial pursuits for a better quality of life.



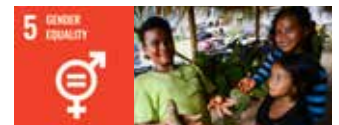
Zero Hunger: Our targeted cashless food aid and community food security projects ensure that families' basic need for food is met. Beneficiaries are given training in the relevant skills for decent work and gainful employment, which in turn translates to more income for household food expenditure.



Good Health and Well-Being: Good health and well-being are promoted through food aid, school sports programmes, community food security initiatives, as well as health screening. In partnership with local health departments, communities are given general screening which includes dental and vision checks, as well as cervical screening and mammogram.



Quality Education: Investments in Back-To-School necessities, computer labs, robotics equipment and school aquaponic edible gardens encourage digital literacy and STEM (Science, Technology, English and Mathematics) education among underprivileged students. Children in rural communities are also not left behind by way of 'jungle schools'.



Gender Equality: Gender equality is promoted by empowering young girls through sports and education, as well as providing women with the choice to manage household food budgets and the opportunity to gain new skills to earn a decent living.



Decent Work and Economic Growth: Our youth development programmes as well as skills training and entrepreneurial income-generation courses help our beneficiaries obtain decent work, thus contributing towards community resilience and nation-building.



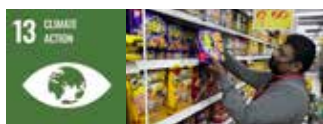
Industry, Innovation and Infrastructure: Our MyKad-based MyKasih cashless payment system ensures that aid is delivered in an efficient, secure and transparent manner to targeted beneficiaries. We continue to innovate to ensure our welfare delivery methods remain relevant and useful.



Reduced Inequalities: Our programmes do not discriminate based on race, gender or people at-risk. In fact, our initiatives also include marginalised and vulnerable communities such as the indigenous peoples or low-income households who are affected or impacted by HIV & AIDS.



Sustainable Cities and Communities: Our work in building sustainable communities starts first with respecting and empowering the people of the land to determine for themselves the kind of projects and activities which would benefit them. The sense of ownership ensures continuity towards resilience and self-sufficiency.



Climate Action: Our innovative cashless welfare distribution platform leverages on retail partners to serve beneficiaries when they shop under the programme. This circumvents additional carbon footprint involved in traditional aid delivery (i.e. procurement, packing, storage and transportation). Other efforts include community farming, tree-planting, and recycling.



Life Below Water: For the wellbeing of communities most vulnerable to climate change, our efforts include protecting the ecosystems they depend on for food and livelihood. At the same time, conserving critical wetlands such as mangrove forests and seagrass beds which serve as buffers from storms and sponges for floodwaters.




Life On Land: Our food security and livelihood initiatives in rural villages focus on resource efficiency (recycling of biodegradables into compost) and sustainable food production, i.e. integrating short-term cash crops with long-term carbon sequestering rubber and fruit trees, as well as livestock cultivation.




Partnerships For The Goals: We work extensively with partners to achieve the above goals. Our stakeholders range from various government agencies and ministries, donors and retail partners, schools and their educators, NGOs and social enterprises, as well as research institutions.

In September 2022, Yayasan Hartalega contributed RM480,000 towards the MyKasih 'Love My School' (LMS) cashless student bursary programme to support 600 students with canteen meals and classroom learning materials.

The students hail from low-income households in Bestari Jaya, Selangor, and are studying in Sekolah Kebangsaan Parit Mahang, Sekolah Kebangsaan Bukit Badong, Sekolah Kebangsaan Bestari Jaya, Sekolah Kebangsaan Ijok, Sekolah Kebangsaan Jaya Setia, and Sekolah Kebangsaan Rantau Panjang.

For eight months from August 2022 to March 2023, each student receives RM100 per month per month through their student smartcard. This contribution is in addition to Yayasan Hartalega's RM50,000 donation to support 500 B40 households spread across Kedah, Negeri Sembilan, Perak, Selangor, and Sarawak via the MyKasih 'Love My Neighbourhood' (LMN) cashless food aid programme earlier this year.

PITSB Strengthens Community Engagement In Pengerang

Pengerang Independent Terminals Sdn. Bhd. (PITSB) has been partnering with MyKasih Foundation since 2012 to provide B40 families with financial relief through food aid.

In June 2022, PITSB continued its monthly cashless food aid support of RM80 per family for 297 families in Pengerang, Johor. In light of the rising cost of goods, PITSB generously increased the monthly allocation to RM110 as of December 2022 and added another 53 families. All families are able to shop for essential food items at MyKasih's partner retail outlets in Pengerang.

Meanwhile, 50 students from PITSB's adopted school, Sekolah Menengah Kebangsaan Pengerang Utama (SMKPU), are receiving RM80 per month via their student smartcard for twelve months commencing June 2022. Under the MyKasih 'Love My School' cashless bursary programme, the student beneficiaries draw upon on their bursaries to purchase meals from the school canteen as well as books and stationeries from the school bookshop.

In encouraging STEM education, PITSB and SMKPU hosted researchers from Universiti Malaya (UM) led by Dr Jillian Ooi and Affendi Yang Amri, to give an environmental awareness talk on seagrass conservation to 322 upper-secondary students on 29 September 2022.

The talk was conducted a day after PITSB staff and SMKPU teachers participated in a seagrass monitoring session at Tanjung Kopok, Johor. PITSB hopes to continuously engage the Pengerang community in raising awareness about the importance of seagrasses for marine life, food security and economic livelihood for coastal communities dependent on them.

DELEUM Aids 250 Families And Students In Four States

Oil and gas support services specialist, Deleum Berhad, continued its ongoing community outreach efforts by partnering with MyKasih to aid 250 families and school students via the latter's flagship cashless welfare programmes.

Deleum contributed RM144,000 towards the 'Love My Neighbourhood' food aid programme to support 150 beneficiary families in Sarawak, Sabah, Terengganu, and Labuan.

The 150 families are receiving a monthly allowance through their MyKad to purchase essential food items at designated retail outlets for 12 months. Deleum is also channeling an additional RM72,000 towards the 'Love My School' student bursary programme.

50 selected primary school students from Sekolah Kebangsaan Pasir Gajah in Kemaman, Terengganu, and 50 students from Sekolah Kebangsaan St Aloysius Limbanak in Kota Kinabalu, Sabah, will draw on the allowances in their MyKasih student smartcard to pay for schoolbooks and stationeries at the school bookstore, as well as food and drinks at the school canteen.

EnQuest Continues To Support Orang Asli Students In Kemaman, Terengganu

Earlier this year, EnQuest renewed its commitment to Sekolah Kebangsaan Sungai Pergam in Kemaman, Terengganu by contributing RM43,920 in student bursaries for 61 students via the MyKasih 'Love My School' programme.

The school has been adopted by the oil and gas company since 2019 and is one of the only two Orang Asli primary schools in Terengganu. Sekolah Kebangsaan Sungai Pergam is also among the 18 Orang Asli primary schools currently being assisted through the empower East Coast Economic Region (ECER)-MyKasih academic programme.

Each student will receive RM60 per month for a year in cashless bursary through their smartcard which they can then use to purchase their daily meals at the school canteen as well as learning materials from their school bookstore.

EnQuest also sponsored Back-To-School (BTS) kits for the students, which they will receive in March 2023 in conjunction with the commencement of the new school term.

Following a similar effort where the company had previously funded the refurbishment of the school canteen in 2019, EnQuest has committed to pay for repair works on the school's classrooms, roof and ceiling.

HSBC Refurbishes Flood-Damaged School Computer Lab

In April 2021, HSBC Malaysia contributed RM500,000 towards the MyKasih 'Love My School' student bursary and #STEMLearning programme for 37 high-need schools nationwide, benefitting close to 9,000 students.

Due to devastating flash floods which happened between December 2021 and January 2022, one of the beneficiary schools, Sekolah Kebangsaan Sungai Berua in Hulu Terengganu, was badly damaged. Sekolah Kebangsaan Sungai Berua is a 100% Orang Asli (indigenous) primary school with students from B40 households.

To ensure the students have access to 21st-century education and digital literacy when schooling resumed, a portion of HSBC's 2021 contribution was spent on refurbishing the school's computer lab. This included re-equipping the lab with 20 units of laptops and 2 sets of Lego Ev3 Robotics toolkits, in addition to tables and chairs, projectors, air-conditioning units, and other electrical appliances.

Rotary Club of Ipoh Supports Five New Schools Under Rotary Kasih

The Rotary Kasih initiative began in 2014 with Rotary District 3300 supporting 15 schools in a matching-fund initiative with MyKasih Foundation. Today, more than 30 schools and over 3,500 students have benefitted from this initiative which provide bursaries for B40 students.

This year, MyKasih welcomes the Rotary Club of Ipoh partner to this initiative.

Using MyKasih's cashless welfare technology, 105 students from three

primary schools in Ipoh (Sekolah Kebangsaan Guru Kalgidhar, Sekolah Kebangsaan Sungei Itek and Sekolah Jenis Kebangsaan Cina Phui Ying) and 60 students from two secondary schools (Kolej Tingkatan Enam and Sekolah Menengah Kebangsaan Aminuddin Baki) are supported with a monthly bursary of RM60 and RM80 respectively from September 2022 to March 2023. This allows the students to purchase food and drinks from their school canteens and school supplies from their school bookshop.

With the RM100 monthly disbursement via their MyKad for six months commencing October 2022, the 80 B40 families will be able to purchase a range of essential food items from participating retail supermarkets and grocery stores.

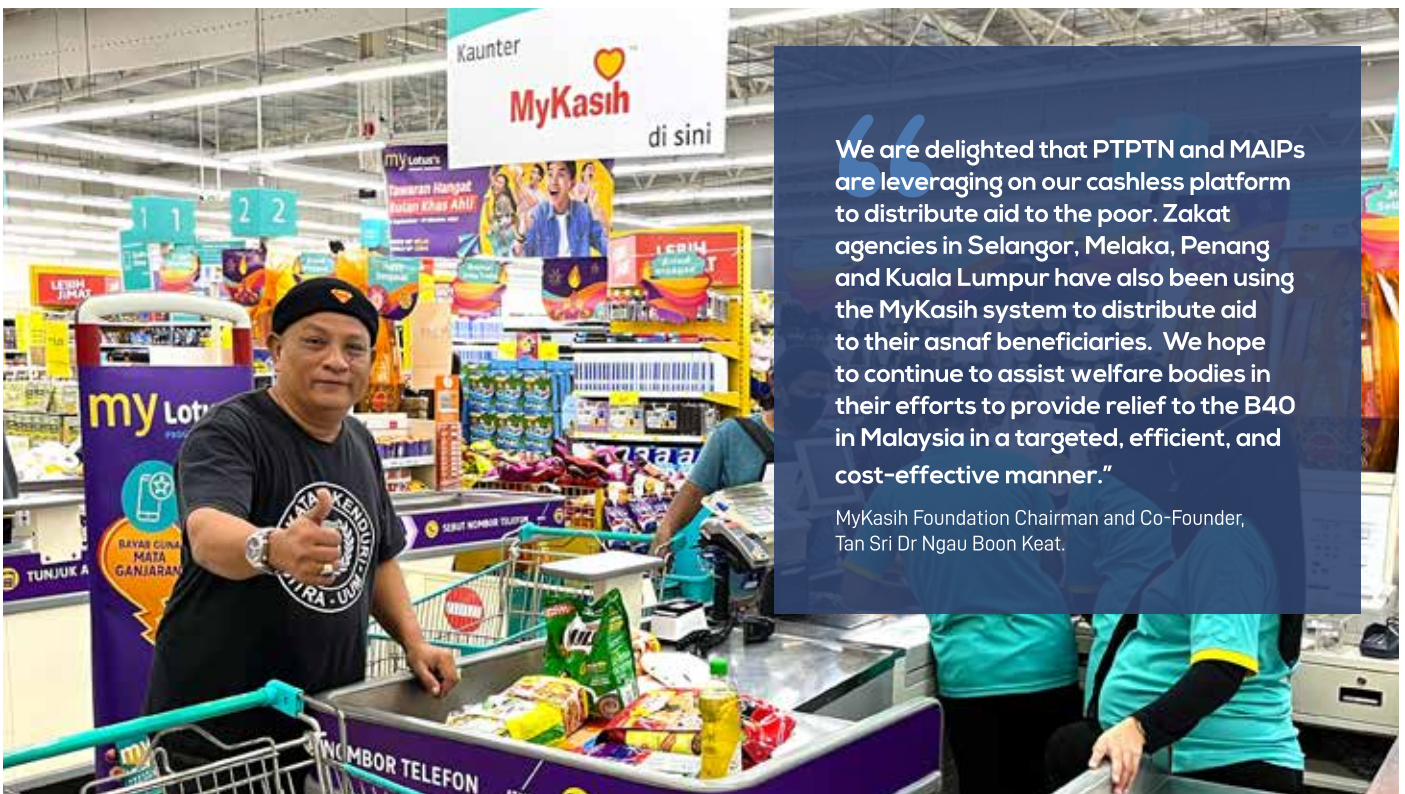

DIALOG Monitors Seagrass Health For Communities' Food Security

Since March 2022, DIALOG, via its terminal operations in Tanjung Langsat, Johor, have been conducting monthly seagrass monitoring activities to gauge the health of seagrass meadows and learn about marine biodiversity, in line with the Group's Environment, Social and Governance (ESG) initiatives.

Led by Reef Check Malaysia and Universiti Malaya, the data from monthly monitoring sessions are now being layered with local community knowledge gathered from Kampung Perigi Aceh and Kampung Tanjung Langsat. Both villages are those closest to the Tanjung Kopok seagrass meadow being monitored.

DIALOG has also been supporting two primary schools in the same communities – namely Sekolah Kebangsaan Perigi Aceh and Sekolah Kebangsaan Tanjung Langsat – via the MyKasih 'Love My School' bursary programme.

During the community engagement sessions, villagers raised concerns over disappearing seagrass beds which they rely on for food and livelihood. The UM team plans to visit these communities regularly with the hopes of identifying villagers who possess traditional or local ecological knowledge of seagrass ecosystems. It is also a good starting point at exploring possible restoration or rehabilitative measures as part of longer-term conservation plans.

By engaging locals who are also currently under the MyKasih 'Love My Neighbourhood' food aid programme, it is hoped that the local communities will become more involved as key stakeholders in the conservation of Johor's precious seagrass meadows.



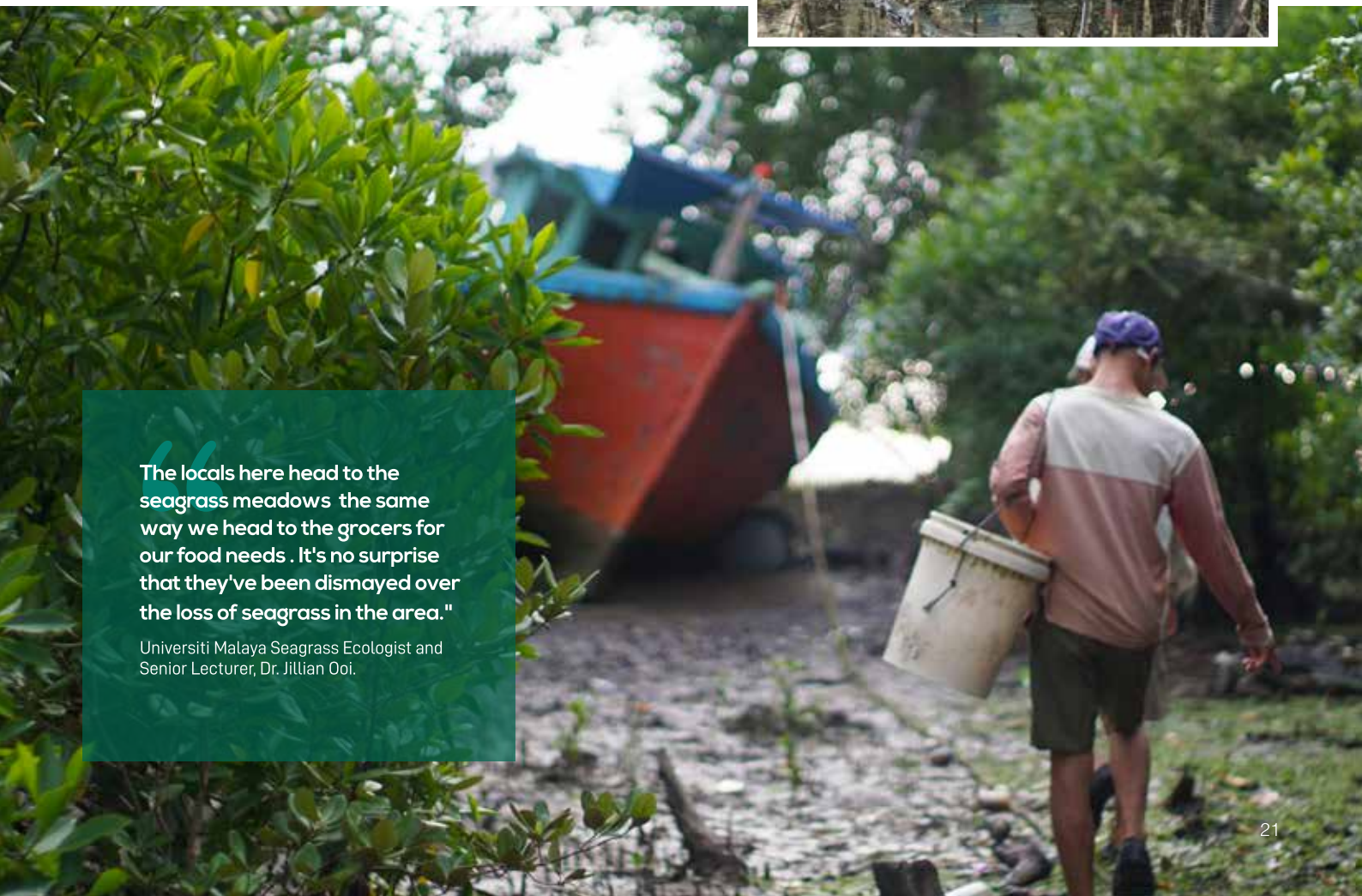

World Food Day

On 16 October 2022, 150 countries celebrated World Food Day, a day celebrated every year to commemorate the date the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization was founded in 1945.

The focus of this day is to recognise that food is a basic and fundamental human right, and activities are planned to raise awareness about those suffering from hunger and what people could do to ensure food and nutritional security for all.

For MyKasih, our entry point into communities is via food assistance. The beneficiaries of the Love My Neighbourhood cashless food aid programme can choose from ten essential food groups and pay for them using their MyKad (national identity card) at participating retailers.

For student beneficiaries of the Love My School Programme, they can use their student smartcard to make cashless purchases of canteen meals and classroom materials at the school.

The children are also given an opportunity to learn vital life skills and grow food in school. MyKasih supports the establishment of edible gardens and aquaponic systems in schools to serve as outdoor classrooms and provide the children with access to nutritious food. Volunteers are also mobilised to help with the garden's maintenance as and when required.

The United Nations Food And Agriculture Organisation (UNFAO) reported that indigenous peoples are guardians of 80 percent of the world's terrestrial biodiversity on 22 percent of the Earth's surface, yet globally, they suffer higher rates of poverty, malnutrition and internal displacement compared to non-indigenous groups.

The UNFAO also shared that two-thirds of those experiencing high acute food insecurity are rural food producers.



When schooling resumed in April 2022, Sekolah Kebangsaan Bukit Lanjan shared that the school's edible garden and aquaponic was a lifeline for the Temuan indigenous community, many of whom lost their jobs during the pandemic. The school donated 197 fish (mainly *tilapia* as well as catfish like *patin*, and *keli* types) which the community consumed, leaving 3 fish behind for reproduction.



400 students at nine rural indigenous learning centres, or jungle schools, are currently taught by local teachers using specially curated modules and lesson plans focusing on basic literacy. The learning centres also have food gardens to reduce chronic malnutrition and stunting among the young. The teachers use the gardens for lessons.



MyKasih engages with local partners and rural indigenous communities to establish food gardens and provide them with skills. The food security and income-generation initiatives in Perak, Pahang, and Kelantan - encompassing organic farming (regenerative agriculture), chicken and fish farming, chilli farming (via fertigation), and stingless bee (*kelulut*) farming for honey – are ongoing.



Protection of vital marine ecosystems such as seagrass meadows is crucial for the food security of coastal communities dependent on them. DIALOG staff volunteers work with researchers from Universiti Malaya to collect monthly monitoring data of the health of seagrasses and provide input for long-term environmental conservation and food security programmes.



The 15 indigenous youths enrolled in the Guwas Komposizon College School of Entrepreneurial and Experiential Development (GKC-SEEDS) in Penampang, Sabah since February 2022 have one more year to complete their two-year vocational stint in sustainable agriculture and food-related businesses.

Upon their graduation in 2024, the youths will return to their respective villages and transfer the knowledge to the rest of their community by running short workshops, leading by example, and injecting new and innovative ideas within the community.

The above community development projects are aligned with the UN Sustainable Development Goals (such as No Poverty, Zero Hunger, Life Above Land, etc) and they provide benefits to communities (better livelihood and food security).

As a global community, we each have a role to play in bringing forward those left behind by making our agrifood systems more inclusive and sustainable. From governments to private companies, civil society, academia, and all individuals, including youth, we all need to be part of the change. – United Nations



MyKasih Students Take On Robotics Challenge

In preparation for the National Robotics Competition (NRC) held in September and October 2022, 30 schools supported under the MyKasih 'Love My School' programme were equipped with Lego® Education robotics kits, courtesy of various donors such as DIALOG, HSBC Malaysia, PROGRAM, Linde, and Pengerang Independent Terminals Sdn Bhd.

Between 1-10 September 2022, primary schools nationwide competed by submitting video entries demonstrating their robotics skills. The participating MyKasih schools competed in the RoboMission Jr: Garden Robot event.

The qualifying teams from each state proceeded to compete in-person at the national level in October 2022. While they did not make the cut, the opportunity gave them the exposure and experience they needed to develop their skills further.

This was the 18th NRC organised by the Malaysian Ministry of Education and its strategic partner, Sasbadi Holdings Berhad, as one of the ministry's high-impact STEM and robotic programmes. Since 2005, NRCs were organised specifically for primary and secondary schools to encourage critical thinking, creativity, innovation, and teamwork among students.

The final winners of the competition had a chance to represent Malaysia at the 19th World Robot Olympiad (WRO) 2022 in Dortmund, Germany in November.

MyKasih Foundation has been supporting PAN Productions since 2015, hosting seven shows in aid of the Orang Asli Children's Education Fund set up by MyKasih's Co-Founder Puan Sri Jean Ngau. Over the last eight years, the fund has collected RM4,224,393 and disbursed RM4,127,135 to-date to support indigenous children in their academic pursuits. This ranges from early childhood education in national-type schools and rural community learning centres (also known as Pusat Didikan Komuniti, PDK), to mainstream 21st-century education (robotics and aquaponics) and vocational studies for out-of-school youths.

DIALOG Group collaborated with Yayasan Pasir Gudang (YPG) on this project by sponsoring the purchase of equipment for 24 women entrepreneurs to help ease their burdens and elevate their business ventures.

One of the recipients is Puan Hasnah binti Md Zin, a 57-year old widow with eight children. Since her husband's passing almost a decade ago, Puan Hasnah has ventured into businesses that she can run from home – from selling mushrooms and frozen chickens to various odd jobs.

Despite already knowing the basics of *tempeh*-making, she enrolled in YPG's course to learn the proper method of producing this much-loved food product. She also visited two local *tempeh* factories to study efficient ways in processing soybeans in large quantities.

Apart from making everything by hand from scratch, Puan Hasnah also wraps each *tempeh* with leaves (*daun tempe*) to keep them fresh and fragrant.

DIALOG is proud to help this dedicated entrepreneur by sponsoring a soybean crusher. Equipped with skills, experience, and appliances, Puan Hasnah plans to expand her business to make *taufu* and *taufu fa*.

Norlidawati, or Norly, is a 36-year-old married mum of two who now runs her own bakery. Her past work experience includes being HR and Administration Executive in a company in Banting.

Prior to joining Yayasan Petronas' MEKAR programme in 2019, Norly was already a home baker. However, she did not know how to expand her business nor did she dream of setting up her own shop. With the training and motivation provided through the programme, Norly could set up her own workshop-bakery, called 'Cik Norly Cakes', which provided employment to other participants and their children. To support her growing enterprise, her husband left his job and devoted his time as her business partner.

Participation in the programme has taught her to be more solution-driven, to think out the box and most importantly, to never give up.



“Although I always wanted to be successful, I did not know how. Even when I started my home baking business, I did not know how to attract more customers and was very wary of taking risks. Today, I have opened my own shop, expanded my cakes and cookies variety, increased my customer base, and have dreams and aspirations that I no longer believe to be impossible. And I was able to do all this in under three years!

I want to create more visibility for my brand, continue to develop new flavours, designs and offerings as well as help others who were once in my situation. I am grateful for the support of my fellow MEKAR friends and now, through our own association – Persatuan Usahawan Aspirasi Wanita Kuala Nerus – we are working together to boost each other's businesses in addition to helping other fledgling local entrepreneurs.”

Beekeeper

Sanusi bin Harun is one of the participants in the *Kelulut* (Stingless Bee) Beekeeping Course, organised by Universiti Malaya Kelantan Business Ventures Sdn Bhd (UMKBV) in partnership with the East Coast Economic Region Development Council (ECERDC), in Sungai Rual, Jeli, Kelantan. He is a native of Kampung Sungai Rual and has great ambitions to be a role model for other villagers, especially young adults his age.

Before joining this course, he worked in the village taking wages for harvesting and selling forest products.

During the *Kelulut* Beekeeping Course which commenced in February 2022, he learnt the methods of breeding and caring for the bees. He mastered the technique of making and installing *kelulut* traps to further expand existing bee colonies and generate income from more honey produced. In addition to tending to the *kelulut* farm, he has learnt to package and sell honey.

He was very proud to have had the opportunity to exhibit and sell their community honey products at the Indigenous Youth Carnival (K-BOARD) held in Seri Kembangan, Selangor on 29 – 30 October 2022. He is now confident enough to articulate the health benefits of honey and share about bee farming methods to exhibitors and carnival visitors which comprised of agencies and indigenous youth from each state.

This experience has made him more enthusiastic and motivated to advance his skills in the sector as well as share his experience with other community members.

Mi Yok Farmer Feature

Mi, an Orang Asli farmer in Pahang, tends to his chickens daily whenever he is not farming or tapping rubber. He purchases them as chicks and grows them free-range in the village until they are about 70-days old, ready to be sold.

Along with 5 other farmers between his village of Kampung Bertang and Kampung Sungai Ruai, the six months of June to November 2022 had them grossing RM24,745 from one sale of 792 chickens. Their free-range *kampung* chickens are currently being sold at RM25/kg, with each chicken averaging 1.3-1.8kg.

As is the way of communal living, 10 percent of the profits are channelled into a Community Fund managed by the village council to be used for various purposes, such as village celebrations, medical emergencies, and children's education (transportation to-from school). The remaining income is returned as capital for the next chicken cycle and the farmer is paid a fair wage for his labour.

The chicken farming project, which started in 2018 and survived two years of COVID-19 pandemic, is executed in collaboration with non-profit Pertubuhan Komuniti Kasih Selangor (PKKS). The main goal of the project is to uplift the economic livelihood and wellbeing of the community as a whole and ensure food security.



DIALOG's contribution helped Mi Yok rebuild his chicken coop after it deteriorated due to neglect during the COVID-19 pandemic. It can now house up to 300 chickens at a time.

In Celebration of International Coastal Cleanup Day 2022

4 2 staff from DIALOG volunteered to clean up Pantai Batu Laut in Tanjong Sepat, Selangor on 10 September in conjunction with International Coastal Clean-up Day 2022. The staff volunteers collected all sorts of washed-up litter, including cigarette butts, lighters, plastic bottles, food containers, face masks, clothes, and a metal drum.

153kg of marine debris was collected in just under two hours!

The volunteers then used the Clean Swell app to quantify the collected waste and contribute to a global coastal and ocean trash database. They also used DIALOG's SisaLab app to organise the collection of recyclables.

We hope participants will be more mindful of their consumption patterns and will take active steps in reducing and recycling their waste.

The clean-up event was made possible by DIALOG staff volunteers, Majlis Perbandaran Kuala Langat, Reef Check Malaysia, and DIALOG ESECO.



International Coastal Clean Up Day 2022 is a global event initiated by the Ocean Conservancy to raise awareness on the threats of coastal debris. The event is locally coordinated on an annual basis by Reef Check Malaysia. This year, Reef Check Malaysia reported 25.5 tonnes of marine debris collected from 400km of coastlines across Malaysia.

DIALOG volunteers are all smiles as they managed to remove 153kg of marine debris from Pantai Batu Laut within two hours.

Setting Up An Urban Garden For Orang Asli Community



50 UPS employees gathered at Sekolah Kebangsaan Bukit Lanjan (Asli) on 26 November, for an active morning of 'gotong royong'.

Working with the teachers, volunteers painted the school walls and assembly stage, and refurbished the gazebo.

They also worked on the school garden, facilitated by staff from Urban Hijau, a social enterprise specialising in urban gardening through permaculture. Equipped with garden hoes, shovels, and gardening tools, the UPS staff worked tirelessly to make banana circles, move soil, prepare compost piles, and clear garden paths.

The work in the garden is the first step in reviving the school garden to encourage more hands-on STEM education among the students, a project executed by Urban Hijau and sponsored by The UPS Foundation as part of their commitment towards community development and education initiatives.

Over the next few months, Urban Hijau will continue to work on the school garden – digging, planting, and composting – while running various workshops for the community and school.

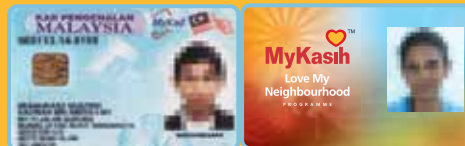


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
