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Dear Friends,

he Covid-19 Movement Control Order (MCO) which came into effect in March this year has had a devastating impact on businesses and activities across various sectors. Consequences were far-reaching, with many losing their jobs and opportunities of getting another were rather slim.

For the poorest of the B40 population, the situation was even more dire as they are mainly daily wage earners, contract labourers, village artisans, home-based small stall operators, farmers and fisher folk dependent on selling their produce directly to customers.

As financially-strained families struggled to feed their dependents, the extended MCO exacerbated their misery. The poor became poorer and they became increasingly dependent on handouts to put food on the table and keep roofs over their heads. Appeals from rural communities were even more deafening as the remoteness of their existence compounded the hardship of accessing aid.

When the Covid-19 pandemic progressed and travel restrictions tightened, social agencies and aid organisations were challenged to mobilise their volunteer resources to procure, pack and deliver food aid to those in need. We reached out to them and offered the use of our cashless aid distribution platform at no cost.

The cashless nature of our food aid programme allowed us to quickly respond to appeals throughout the country as it could

be activated remotely. Corporations and NGOs reaching out to underserved communities kept their staff safe at home while letting the system handle aid distribution.

On our end, we initiated a campaign to raise funds to help poor Malaysians with food. With the generous support from donors, we raised RM 2.5 million and channelled it to 10,000 families nationwide to help them cope with the MCO. In this issue, we share updates on these programmes and also highlight the events which had taken place prior to the MCO.

Even as the MCO eases, we are aware that the situation remains bleak for many families as they attempt to regain financial independence in the months to come. We are currently embarking on a post-MCO fund-raising campaign to sustain aid distribution to families in need.

My wife and I appreciate the continued faith you have in the work that we do through MyKasih. These are unprecedented times and we thank you from the bottom of our hearts for your enduring kindness and generosity for the communities we care for.




MyKasih Today

MyKasih started with a pilot MyKasih 'Love My Neighbourhood' food aid project involving 25 families back in December 2008. To-date, we have channeled **RM 280 million** via the MyKasih cashless payment system to more than **280,000 families** in over 400 locations nationwide, out of which, 20,000 are primary and secondary student beneficiaries aided through the MyKasih 'Love My School' bursary scheme.



The scope of the MyKasih system has expanded beyond food aid and student bursaries to include cashless payments for public transportation, fuel, medical treatments and utility bills. Essentially, the MyKad account becomes the single main account to which low-income households can use to access multiple welfare products or services.

The Ministry of Urban Wellbeing, Housing and Local Government, Johor and Sarawak State Governments, Lembaga Zakat Selangor, Zakat Pulau Pinang and Majlis Agama Islam Melaka, have also been using the innovative MyKasih system for their respective welfare programmes for the underprivileged.





stablished in 2009, MyKasih Foundation is a charity organisation founded by DIALOG's Executive Chairman Tan Sri Dr Ngau Boon Keat and his wife Puan Sri Jean Ngau, to help low-income families through food aid and education regardless of race, religion or descent.

MyKasih not only aims to improve nutrition through its food aid programme but also strives to transform the families through skills training and education, especially for their children, to break the poverty cycle and give them hope for a better future.

What is significant is that MyKasih uses leading-edge technology to

support its aid distribution. The MyKasih 'Love My Neighbourhood' food aid programme and the MyKasih 'Love My School' student bursary scheme run on an efficient cashless payment system developed by DIV Services Sdn Bhd, a subsidiary of DIALOG.

All disbursements and payments are effected through the use of the MyKad, which is the chip-based ID card issued to all Malaysians. Use of the MyKad allows us to target aid to the right person, enabling us to distribute aid in an efficient, transparent and secure way. This feature is probably the first of its kind in welfare distribution in the world.

OUR FOOD AID PROGRAMME...

The MyKasih 'Love My Neighbourhood' is a cashless food aid programme which reaches out to families earning a combined monthly household income of RM 1,500 and below. Recipients receive a monthly allowance of RM 80 through their MyKad account, which can be spent on approved essential items at partner retail outlets.

The approved food items range from ten different product categories such as rice, noodles, bread, biscuits, eggs, seasoning, flour, cooking oil, canned food and beverages. The list of approved items can be expanded to include basic household appliances and schooling necessities for post-disaster relief.



OUR STUDENT BURSARY PROGRAMME...

Under the MyKasih 'Love My School' bursary programme, students from economically-challenged backgrounds are given annual bursaries via a smartcard linked to their MyKad account, to pay for meals at the school canteen and to purchase school books and stationery from the school bookshop.

Additional support is rendered through sponsorship of extra tuition classes, study camps, English literacy and numeracy workshops, and computer labs for 21st century learning. Robotics, aquaponic projects and sports activities are also funded to enhance their learning experience in school.



OUR ORANG ASLI CHILDREN'S EDUCATION FUND...

School drop-outs are most rampant amongst the Orang Asli, and the single, greatest contributing factor to the dropout is poverty. The 'Orang Asli Children's Education Fund' was set up to support indigenous children in national schools and those attending afterschool classes at community learning centers.

In catering to the unique needs of the community, the fund ensures that Orang Asli children, especially those in rural areas, are not left behind and are able to attain an education and an opportunity to develop to their fullest potential.



OUR SUPPLEMENTARY ASSISTANCE PROGRAMMES...

In our effort to help our beneficiaries break out of the poverty cycle, we work with training partners to provide skills and entrepreneurship training to empower them with knowledge and skills to realise their full potential and achieve financial independence.

Additionally, health awareness programmes and screenings are done in collaboration with the Ministry of Health and the National Population and Family Development Board (locally known as 'LPPKN') to support the holistic well-being of our beneficiaries.



HOW YOU CAN HELP...

We rely on funding from donors to carry out all of the above community and school programmes. Companies are welcome to adopt MyKasih's programmes and brand them accordingly as part of their on-going corporate social responsibility initiatives.



Every ringgit goes a long way in making a difference. All cash donations to MyKasih Foundation are taxexempted and are passed in full to the beneficiaries.

MyKasih will oversee the expenditure and disbursements to ensure that funds are used strictly for their intended purposes. Donors will receive fund utilisation reports detailing the purchasing trends, progress of projects undertaken, as well as impacts and outcomes of investments made.

Rotary Kasih enters its sixth year this 2020

On 6 March 2020, 48 students of SRJK Bandar Sri Sendayan, a primary school located in Seremban, Negeri Sembilan, received their Rotary Kasih student smartcards from Rotary Club of Nilai Sentral.

Since 2015, Rotarians of Rotary International District 3300 Malaysia have been working hand-in-hand with MyKasih Foundation to positively impact 1,000 primary and secondary students in sixteen schools across five states in Peninsula Malaysia through the Rotary Kasih student life transformation programme.

Both Rotary and MyKasih have each committed RM 250,000 per annum on a matching fund basis for the programme. Rotary Kasih adopts MyKasih's cashless bursary scheme where students are able to draw upon monthly allowances of RM 60-80 and pay for meals and learning necessities sold at the school canteen and bookstore using their Rotary Kasih smartcard.

Other than lessening the burden of financially-challenged families in educating and nourishing their children, the project aims to enhance the students' learning abilities through values-based programmes, which include mentoring and coaching, as well as opportunities to participate in leadership seminars and motivation camps.

In thanking Rotary for their continued support, MyKasih Foundation Chairman and Co-Founder Tan Sri Dr Ngau Boon Keat said, "The Rotarians have been a wonderful community partner to work with since our Foundation's inception in 2009. They have helped us to identify poor families for food aid, and carried out free health screening and vision screening for our beneficiary families and students."

The MyKasih 'Love My School' programme was launched on 21 February 2020 in Sekolah Kebangsaan Kampung Tunku, Petaling Jaya, with Agility Logistics.

"SK Kampung Tunku has a student population of 1,200 students and 60-70 percent come from the B40 segment of Malaysia. As much as possible, the school's Parent Teacher Association's kitty is tapped into for various activities. However, we are very much dependent on the goodwill of kind corporations, social-purpose organisations and non-profits to ensure that the underprivileged students are also able to effectively participate in school programmes beneficial to them," said Khairul Anuar.

This effectively allows the students to save any pocket money they might have to participate in extra-curricular activities.

MITRA helps B40 Indians buy food and school essentials



On Friday, 17 January 2020, Minister in the Prime Minister's Department (National Unity and Social Wellbeing) Senator P. Waytha Moorthy launched the Akshaya Patra food aid programme with over 50 recipient families at Giant Hypermarket Setapak, Kuala Lumpur.

The Malaysian Indian Transformation Unit (MITRA), led by Senator Waytha, had allocated RM 5.4 million for the Akshaya Patra food aid programme. 3,000 recipients from the B40 segment across the nation received RM 150 a month for 12 months, credited directly into their MyKad (Malaysian identity card) account to pay for essential food items at participating retail outlets such as Mydin, TF Valuemart, Econsave, Giant, Tesco and 99 Speedmart.

Running in tandem with the food aid initiative, MITRA allocated another RM 2.5 million to be channelled directly 13,518 underprivileged Indian Primary Year 6 students to prepare for Secondary Year 1 this 2020 academic year. The aid is distributed in a cashless manner via MyKasih smartcards, where each student beneficiary is given RM 150 to spend on schooling necessities such as school shoes, uniform, bags and stationery.

The beneficiaries were identified through the eKasih system under the Implementation Coordination Unit (ICU) of the Prime Minister's Department.

MyKasih Foundation Chairman and Co-Founder, Tan Sri Dr Ngau Boon Keat said, "We are happy that MITRA has found MyKasih's cashless platform efficient and useful in delivering aid to beneficiaries under its food aid and back-to-school programme. We have enabled our platform to be used by other organisations or institutions for charitable purposes with the objective of ensuring that funds reach targeted beneficiaries in a secure and transparent manner, and are used for their intended purposes".

The first Sunday of March 2020 saw HSBC Malaysia representatives, trainers from SURI Lifestyle, and 22 Orang Asli women from Bukit Lanjan and Sungai Buloh, Selangor, celebrate the completion of the 'Green Jeans Sewing Skills Training and Entrepreneurship Programme.

Between September 2019 and February 2020, the women produced ten different bag designs, ranging from pouches to sling bags, and even school bag packs. The overall aim was to encourage the women to earn income with their new creative sewing skills.

SURI Lifestyle Chief Executive Officer, Salena Binti Ahmad, thanked HSBC Malaysia for providing the women, who were formerly MyKasih food aid recipients, with an opportunity to earn a decent living.

"I consider these women to be very fortunate to have had this opportunity to learn a new skill, courtesy of HSBC and MyKasih. There are many women out there who can only dream of participating in such courses. I hope these graduates will not waste the skills and knowledge they have gained and put it to good use for the benefit of their families," added Salena, who had a team of four facilitators guiding the MyKasih participants under her tutelage.

Now that the women have completed 18 sewing modules over a series of 24 classroom sessions, they are confidently taking orders for pouches and sling bags from family and community members. Some of them will soon be matched with Back-To-School and corporate gifts consignment orders by SURI Lifestyle.

One of the participants, Marini Binti Apeng, appreciated learning the various techniques involved in producing good quality saleable products. She was recognised by SURI Lifestyle for her neat and creative work, which she attributed to having patience, passion for learning and a positive attitude. As an Orang Asli who works odd jobs like farming and harvesting plants and herbs from the nearby jungle, this new creative sewing skill has given her the opportunity to earn money from home. This, in turn, allows her to better care for her child with disabilities.

Soleha Binti Ali was one of the participants who recorded 100 percent attendance throughout the sewing course, despite having young children and a toddler she was still nursing.

"I am very happy with the creative skills I have attained as this has allowed me to earn money while being a stay-at-home mother. While I am sad that the course is over, I look forward to more opportunities this new experience might bring me," said Soleha during the event.

In expressing her gratitude to HSBC, MyKasih and SURI, Fadillah Hanum Binti Mat thanked her lucky stars for being given a spot in the programme.

"The income I have generated thus far is indeed a real blessing," said Fadillah.

HSBC's 'Future Skills and Employability' green jeans project for the Orang Asli women also had an environmental spin-off. Over the project period of 22 weeks, 330 pairs of denim jeans and 660 jeans pockets were unstitched and upcycled by 100 HSBC staff volunteers to provide the project with fabric materials the women needed.

This is a significant plus point for the project, as textile waste makes up to six percent of the total 3 million tonnes of solid waste in Malaysia filling up our landfills, and up to 75 percent of that textile waste is actually recyclable.

On 14 January 2020, the Northern Corridor Implementation Authority (NCIA) launched the empower@NCER-MyKasih academic programme in Sungkai, Perak. This follows a series of state-level empower@NCER launches in Kedah, Perlis and Penang since November 2019.

The Perak event was officiated by Perak Menteri Besar, YAB Ahmad Faizal Azumu, who at the same time, launched other human capital and entrepreneurship development programmes, such as the entrepreneur@NCER, **NCER** Talent Enhancement Programme, and Bumiputera Facilitation Fund. The programmes are aimed at boosting the livelihood of the B40 community and eradicating poverty in the states.

MyKasih and NCIA signed a Memorandum of Understanding in April 2019 to collaborate on the empower@NCER academic programme, which reaches out to high-need schools in the northern states of Perak, Kedah, Penang and Perlis.

To-date, 15 schools have been enlisted under the academic initiative, where eligible students are provided monthly bursaries. The schools are also equipped with computer labs, robotics, and aquaponics systems for the edible garden projects to enrich the students' learning experience. Extra-curricular activities such as sports, music, waste recycling initiatives, and study camps are also supported.

PROGRAM supports Orang Asli children's education in Perak and **Pahang**

Last year, PROGRAM supported five rural community learning centers in Raub, Pahang, and in Gerik, Perak, for a period of six months (September 2019 to February 2020). Due to the remoteness of these villages, the communities lack access to basic amenities and proper infrastructure. As a result, many children do not attend government schools.

PROGRAM's support covered food rations for the students' daily meals, learning and teaching materials, as well as sports and play equipment essential for the dayto-day running of activities for a total of 124 Orang Asli children. Four months into the programme, not only did the children receive regular nourishment and basic literacy lessons, their entire communities benefitted from several positive spin-offs such as receiving funding to build a dedicated learning space for the students, equipped with proper toilets to ensure hygiene and sanitation.

This year, PROGRAM is continuing their support of education with MyKasih with a contribution of RM 250,000 towards the 'Love My School' bursary programme in SK Batu 14, Perak and SK Bukit Gemuruh, Pahang.

Starting in March 2020, a total of 350 students will receive cashless bursaries worth RM 60 per month through their student smartcards to pay for meals and other essentials at school.

Nurturing green fingers

Establishing edible gardens in schools

After a successful pilot aquaponics edible garden project in SK Bukit Lanjan (Asli) in Damansara Perdana in August 2019, MyKasih has established 38 aguaponics systems in other schools to-date as part of the 'Love My School' initiative.

School teachers use the aquaponics as an outdoor classroom to teach Bahasa Malaysia, English, Science and Mathematics.



They are also able to impart fundamentals of environmental consciousness and social responsibility while teaching the students about food production. The school canteen operator procures the vegetables and fish to prepare meals for the students. Fish stocks are replenished as they are being consumed. This teaches the children about sustainable production and mindful consumption, while giving them a balanced diet of proteins and greens at school.

Benefits of aquaponics

Aquaponics is the combination of aquaculture (raising fish) and hydroponics (the soil-less growing of plants) that grows fish and plants together in one integrated system. As part of the cycle, the water passes through a tank of fish, and it carries with it waste from the fish. This fish waste is a concentrated mix of nutrients and minerals converted by beneficial bacteria, which are absorbed by the plants. The water is continuously recirculated through the system powered by a pump.

Aquaponic systems have only one 'input', which is fish feed - no other fertilisers or chemicals are needed for the plants to flourish. Meanwhile, there are also no 'outputs', other than edible food. As the system is self-contained, there is no runoff of chemicals. Because this type of farming does not require soil, aquaponic systems can be established anywhere, vertically or horizontally, in warehouses, basements, or on rooftops of buildings.

In light of the Covid-19 pandemic and when the Movement Control Order (MCO) came into effect mid-March 2020, MyKasih Foundation initiated a campaign to raise funds to help poor Malaysians with essential food supplies.

The cashless nature of our welfare programme allowed us to continue to respond to appeals for assistance throughout the country, which exploded as people lost their jobs and were struggling to feed their families.

We assessed the needs of families and communities under our care and embarked on one of the most critical fund-raisers since our establishment 10 years ago.

RM 2.1 million worth of food aid were distributed to 9,000 families, 850,000 face masks distributed to frontliners, MyKasih beneficiaries and NGO partners, and RM 700,000 million worth of medical equipment and protective gear were supplied to 6 hospitals fighting the Covid battle.

We could not have done it without the trust and support of our donors and partners on the ground.

Subsequent pages of this newsletter documents the efforts of corporations and individuals who collaborated with MyKasih to respond to Malaysia's clarion call to care for her people.



DIALOG puts people first

DIALOG Group Bhd continues to uphold its responsibility as a caring corporate citizen towards staff and communities where it operates.

Since the start of the COVID-19 Movement Control Order (MCO), the integrated oil & gas services company had contributed more than RM 3.7 million towards the fight against the pandemic.

This includes RM 1 million to The Edge Covid-19 Health Care Workers Support Fund and Equipment Fund; RM 500,000 to Johor State's Tabung Bencana Johor; and RM 220,000 to MyKasih Foundation to provide cashless food aid support B40 families.

"Health and safety is always a priority. When the MCO came into effect, we immediately procured 1 million face masks which were promptly distributed. More than 850,000 pieces went to the frontliners in the Royal Malaysia Police force (PDRM), hospitals, state governments, Ministries, NGOs, as well as schools and families which DIALOG has adopted through MyKasih Foundation," said DIALOG's Executive Chairman, Tan Sri Dr Ngau Boon Keat.

Of course, charity begins at home. The Group also distributed over 60,000 face masks to its employees, directors, advisors and their families, locally and internationally, as a gesture of compassion and gratitude for their support.

"I am grateful for the support from our management team and the teamwork of those involved on the ground to ensure that our various CSR initiatives are smoothly implemented. The most important outcomes are that everyone is safe and in good health, and those in need of aid have received them. We must remain resilient in our fight against the COVID-19 pandemic," added Tan Sri Dr Ngau.



Through MyKasih Foundation, DIALOG committed RM 4.4 million this year to support 560 underpriviledged families and 3,400 students in need with yearlong cashless food aid and bursaries.

Now that schools are closed throughout the MCO and the situation of poverty has become even more acute for families who were already struggling to put food on the table, DIALOG and its joint venture companies, Pengerang Independent Terminals Sdn Bhd (PITSB) and Kertih Terminals Sdn Bhd (KTSB), are providing additional assistance to help the families ride out the extended MCO period.

The cashless nature of MyKasih's welfare distribution enables the food aid programme to be executed remotely. Recipients will be able to purchase essential food items using their MyKad at MyKasih's partner retail outlets located in their neighbourhood (within 10km from their homes) and therefore will not be breaching MCO rules.







Recipients of the food aid are able to choose the items they need on their own while adhering to government Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) during the MCO.



Through MyKasih, we are able to provide relief to families who are struggling to put food on the table during these trying times. We also hope to play our part in flattening the Covid-19 curve by keeping social workers safe at home, while letting the MyKasih welfare delivery system render assistance directly to those with immediate food needs.

Symphony Life Berhad aids urban poor in Selangor

With the Hari Raya Aidilfitri celebrations just around the corner, property developer Symphony Life Berhad contributed RM 56,720 in the spirit of giving to support 57 families from PPR Baiduri and Flat Sri Aman in Petaling Jaya, Selangor.

The families are being aided for one year under the MyKasih 'Love My Neighbourhood' food aid programme, starting mid-May 2020.

In preparation for Hari Raya, the beneficiaries began their cashless food aid shopping, where they were able to purchase essentials such as rice, eggs, bread, milk, noodles, cooking oil, canned food, sauces of various brands, at MyKasih's partner retail outlet in the neighbourhood, Giant Kelana Jaya.

The outreach follows an earlier contribution which the company made in April to support the same 57 families with food aid to help them cope with the Covid-19 MCO that had severely affected their livelihoods.

The 57 recipient families, whose breadwinners are mainly daily wage earners and petty traders, were extremely grateful for the aid. Due to MCO restrictions, the recipients were briefed over the phone by MyKasih staff on the essential items they were allowed to purchase under the cashless food aid programme and how to pay with their MyKad.

"I enjoyed using the MyKasih system when buying food for my family, as I get to choose the items I needed. For instance, I won't buy sugar because we already have enough. I would buy more rice and eggs, since that would meet our nutritional needs. Thank you, Symphony Life!" said Abdullah Nafail, a father of three, who previously worked as a waiter before the pandemic rendered him unemployed.

HSBC helps families during tough MCO period

HSBC Malaysia made a charitable donation of RM 371,000 in May 2020 to support two projects in collaboration with MyKasih.

The first was an income-generation project for 10 women to sew personal protective equipment (PPE)s; while the other was to render a one-off food aid assistance to 1,705 families in Sabah to help them through the MCO period.

This project swiftly followed the previous HSBC-funded Future Skills programme called "MyKasih x SURI Green Jeans Orang Asli community programme," where 22 women were trained with sewing skills by SURI Lifestyle from September 2019 to February 2020.

The materials to be made into 1,600 PPEs such as boots, hoods and gowns, were donated by accredited social enterprise Biji-Biji Initiative. Each of the 10 project participants were able to earn an estimated income of RM 2,700 to RM 4,750 (depending on how

many PPEs they are able to sew) from the comfort and safety of their home. This will supplement their livelihood as daily wage earners, which have been severely affected by the MCO. In addition to the aid which some of these participants have received from the government and JAKOA, this HSBCfunded PPE project will help these MyKasih beneficiaries and their families survive the extended MCO period.

Nor Faridah Binti Abdullah, 29 years old, is a mother of 5 young children. Her husband works as a bodyguard. Unfortunately, with the MCO, his employee had reduced his pay, making it difficult for the family to make ends

During this MCO, the graduates of the programme were offered the opportunity to generate additional income by sewing PPE for the frontliners. They are paid for the number of boots, gowns and hoods that they are able to produce.

"I'm so happy that I was able to get this project to sew PPE for the frontliners at the Klang Hospital. I am able to generate additional income to help my husband and at the same time, I am also able to contribute to the society by sewing these PPE. It definitely feels good and I'm really excited. Thank you, HSBC, MyKasih and SURI Lifestyle for this opportunity!" said Nor Faridah.

One-off MCO food aid in Sabah

Answering the call for help from rural Sabah, HSBC allocated RM 200 per family for food aid for 1,705 indigenous families located throughout Kota Belud, Keningau and Ranau.

Families were able to pay for essential food items under the cashless MyKasih 'Love My Neighbourhood' food aid programme at participating merchant outlets, over the span of two months.

MyKasih's local NGO partner, PACOS Trust, who identified the 1,705 families in need, shared that families in rural Sabah were badly impacted during the MCO. Most of the breadwinners for these families are daily wage earners or petty traders who have lost their source of income due to the restrictions made in line with the MCO. The food shortage faced by these rural communities in Sabah was made worse by a drought in December 2019, which badly affected their farmed produce such as paddy.

Through MyKasih's cashless welfare distribution platform, recipients purchased essential food items for themselves. eliminating the need for NGO partners such as PACOS Trust to physically procure, pack and distribute aid to target beneficiaries. In turn, donors and the NGOs involved will be able to do their part in flattening the Covid-19 curve while ensuring the communities they serve have adequate food during this trying period.



HSBC Malaysia has partnered with MyKasih for over 10 years, and we are honoured and humbled to be part of meaningful initiatives to combat COVID-19. PETRONITA celebrates the joy of giving with Program Ramadhan Sadaqah

Ramadhan is a great opportunity to spread the tenets of Islam and more specifically, its values of spirituality, generosity and kindness to others. The remaining days of Ramadan encourage us to reflect on the good deeds acquired throughout the blessed month and embrace the spirit of giving in ushering in the month of Syawal.

The Covid-19 pandemic has highlighted the plight of the poor struggling to put food on the table, made worse by the loss of jobs due to the MCO which came into effect on March 18. NGOs and other social-purpose organisations faced challenges in delivering aid to the needy due to travel limitations and associated health risks, which has made the situation of those afflicted by poverty even more

PETRONITA collaborated with MyKasih Foundation for the first time to adopt the latter's cashless method of delivering aid to B40 families in need. 200 families from various locations within the Klang Valley are able to observe Ramadhan with the assurance of food on the table.

The MyKasih food aid programme runs on a proprietary chip technology of the MyKad which enables charity funds to be channelled in a secure, targeted and transparent manner, directly to rightful recipients via their MyKad. Each beneficiary family was given an allowance of RM 200 via their MyKad account to purchase provisions at MyKasih's partner retail outlets.

The MyKasih programme has a barcodescanning process, which ensures that only approved essential food items, such as rice, noodles, cooking oil, eggs, bread, biscuit, seasoning, beverages, and canned food, are purchased. This safeguards donors' funds, while at the same time, restores dignity to the underprivileged by letting them choose for themselves the food items they need, and to purchase them only when they need it.

importantly, minimises food wastage and removes the health and safety risks towards social workers and volunteers, who would otherwise have to procure, pack and deliver food aid to the beneficiaries during this critical MCO period.

LINACO Group jumped into action during the COVID-19 Movement Control Order (MCO), contributing RM 72,700 worth in food aid to support 30 recipients in Selangor who had lost their jobs as cleaners and roadside food vendors. The recipients received a monthly allocation of RM 200 for one year to help buffer the impact of losing their source of livelihood.

In collaboration with Yayasan Generasi Gemilang, the recipients were identified and their cashless food aid allocation was activated remotely. This ensures that volunteers and donors are able to stay safe at home, while recipients can go out at their convenience to MyKasih's partner merchants located within 10km from their respective homes, practice social distancing, and purchase the essential food items they need using their MyKad.

"I am overwhelmed by emotions upon receiving this food aid. I feel so thankful, happy and touched. Thank you so much to Linaco, Yayasan Gemilang and MyKasih for helping me and my family," said one of the 30 new recipients who received the MyKasih 'Love My Neighbourhood' food aid programme during the MCO period.

In addition to these 30 recipients, food aid support for Linaco's 115 MyKasih families continue undisrupted, ensuring adequate food for the entire family throughout this difficult period.

Linde Global pitches in to expand food aid initiative nationwide

The struggles of Malaysian communities who were financially impacted by the Movement Control Order (MCO) were heard by Linde, whose global offices pitched in with funding amounting to RM 90,000 to support 630 families with food essentials.

Among the first few beneficiaries of Linde's charitable initiative at the start of the MCO were vulnerable poor families from Sungai Petani in Kedah, Kuala Terengganu in the east coast, as well as the Orang Asli from Pos Sinderut in Pahang, Segamat in Johor and Pos Piah in Perak.

In also looking after communities where Linde's business operates, 210 out of the 630 beneficiary families are located in Kuching, Sarawak, Pasir Gudang in Johor, and Kota Kinabalu in Sabah. Over the period of three months, from July to September 2020, these families will receive RM 100 each month via their Mykad account to make cashless purchases of provisions at MyKasih's partner retail outlets within their neighbourhood.





Heineken Malaysia feeds 865 B40 families during MCO

HEINEKEN Malavsia Berhad (HEINEKEN Malaysia) donated basic food items to 865 B40 families to enable them to prepare an estimated 80,000 meals for a month. The community aid programme, which started on March 26 and continued until early June, was one of the initiatives HEINEKEN had opted for to help vulnerable families cope with the loss of income during the Movement Control Order (MCO).

The beneficiaries are Malaysians of all ethnic groups residing in Desa Mentari, Bestari Java and Hulu Langat in Selangor. i.e. communities around HEINEKEN's brewery and watershed area, who are most affected by the COVID-19 situation. These are daily or minimum wage earners earning between RM 600 to RM 2,000 per month and having to support from three to 12 family members.

HEINEKEN Malaysia Managing Director, Roland Bala, said, "People are at the heart of our company. Besides looking after our employees' wellbeing, we have been reaching out to communities in need around our brewery. We understand the sudden transition that these families have had to go through during this unprecedented situation, so we want to ease their burden by providing food."

The first phase of HEINEKEN Malaysia's relief efforts saw 120 families from the B40 communities around its Sungei Way Brewery and watershed area in Sungai Selangor, mainly Bestari Jaya and Hulu Langat, benefit from basic food items such as rice, cooking oil, eggs, biscuits, flour and powdered beverages.

For the second phase, HEINEKEN Malaysia partnered with MyKasih Foundation to channel funds directly to 625 beneficiaries via their MyKad to be used at selected supermarkets. Through this arrangement, each beneficiary was able to purchase RM 320 worth of essentials from ten food categories, which include rice, infant milk formula, canned food, such as sardines and tuna, eggs, cooking oil, and biscuits. As the company continued to respond to more appeals from the ground, an additional

120 families were aided in June with a one-off food aid support worth RM 100 per family.

Desa Mentari's Block 1 Joint Management Board community leader, Arulmani Kaniappan, said "At Desa Mentari, many of us are severely impacted by the MCO as we live on a day-to-day basis. Our community is quite large, a lot with big families, so although we try to support each other as much as we can, it is really heartwarming to have HEINEKEN Malaysia step in and offer us so much. We are grateful for the help we have received as every bit counts."

JTI responds swiftly to plight of the poor

JTI Malaysia was one of the first few corporate donors to respond to MyKasih's campaign to support B40 families impacted by the Movement Control Order (MCO) which came into effect in March 2020.

The company mobilised RM 172,380 worth of food aid to support 488 families across seven locations in five states, including 66 Orang Asli families in Gerik and 60 B40 families in Kampar, Perak, and 197 Orang Asli families in Gua Musang, Kelantan.



Yayasan Hasanah special grant 2020 helps B40 communities recover from pandemic

Yayasan Hasanah, in partnership with the Ministry of Finance Malaysia, launched a special grant - Hasanah Special Grant (HSG) 2020 to support social programmes aimed at improving the quality of life of targeted groups such as the poor or bottom 40 (B40) communities.

As part of the government's Economic Stimulus Package 2020 to offset the economic impact from Covid-19 fallout, projects under the HSG can be implemented anywhere in Malaysia over a duration of three to 12 months, from May 2020 until April 2021.

Yayasan Hasanah Managing Director, Shahira Ahmed Bazari, said, "The funds are meant to improve the quality of life of vulnerable individuals and families in Malaysia and to help them recover from the COVID-19 pandemic. The special grant is to enable rapid mobilisation of resources to Civil Society Organisations (CSOs), Non-Governmental Organisations (NGOs) and Social Enterprises (SE) to extend assistance to vulnerable groups such as refugees, Orang Asal, elderly, homeless, at-risk children, women and youth; and persons with disabilities or people with special needs, in order to build and maintain community resiliency in this time of need."

MyKasih was amongst the first few grantees of the PRIHATIN special grant initiative by Yayasan Hasanah and the Ministry of Finance, to receive RM249,900 to support 833 families in Pahang, Penang, Perak, Selangor, Kuala Lumpur and Terengganu, with food aid worth RM 100 per family per month for a period of three months commencing June 2020.

The communities were selected based on previous or on-going community development interventions such as skills training (e.g. sewing, craft making, farming, cooking, baking) and entrepreneurial income-generation programmes, rural Orang Asli community learning centers supported with community feeding programmes for malnourished children, and educational assistance such as student bursaries, study camps, children's sports development, edible garden projects, and 21st century learning (i.e. robotics and computer lab refurbishments). The aim is to continue to build and maintain social and economic resilience amongst vulnerable groups who have been given the opportunity to improve their quality of life, but were severely set back by the pandemic.

We received feedback from communities that the MCO has set them back significantly. Those who had started their own home cottage businesses are struggling to make ends meet, while others who were previously on the MyKasih food aid programme are appealing for more assistance as they no longer have the means to make a decent living. We are deeply grateful to Yayasan Hasanah and the Ministry of Finance Malaysia for allocating these funds which will go a long way in helping the families weather the Covid storm.
